Building on last year, there will also be a session dedicated to patient engagement research to help us become more familiar and comfortable with this new aspect of clinical research. Lastly, new on this year's program is a joint breakout session for investigators and research coordinators, meant to encourage discussion on a variety of issues and topics.

2. HEAR AND LEARN FROM RENOWNED SPEAKERS

We are pleased to welcome two exciting plenary speakers at this year's conference.

Hailing from Mainz, Germany, Dr. Stavros Konstantinides will deliver our first plenary talk. He is a Professor for Clinical Trials and Deputy Scientific Director of the Centre for Thrombosis and Haemostasis at the University of Mainz and will present on thrombolysis of PE and how this has guided the design of the PEITHO-III trial. The PEITHO-III trial is being conducted internationally and is endorsed by the International Network of Venous Thromboembolism Clinical Research Networks (INVENT), an initiative spearheaded by CanVECTOR.

Our second plenary speaker will be Dr. Brian Rowe, the current Scientific Director of the CIHR Institute of Circulatory and Respiratory Health. Dr. Rowe is also a professor in the Department of Emergency Medicine and the School of Public Health at the University of Alberta (Edmonton). He holds a Tier I Canada Research Chair in Evidence-based Emergency Medicine. Dr. Rowe will present data on the current research landscape as well as what we can expect from the ICRH in future years.

The Patient Perspective: Reflecting on Past Experiences

For the first edition of The Patient Perspective, we wanted to hear from our newest members of the External Advisory Board: two very experienced patient engagement advisors. We asked them some questions; to start off, here are their answers to one of those questions.

Question: What are the most rewarding aspects of patient engagement, from your experience?

ANSWER: I have been very fortunate to work and collaborate with some amazing people; from patients, academic researchers, clinicians, funders, and policy makers. I've been able to build long term working relationships with people who are committed to helping to improve healthcare. I have learned so much and gained an education from the many people who have invested and supported me in my work in patient engagement and patient-oriented research. One of the most exciting aspects of patient engagement is working with other patients to help to bring the collective voice to health research and healthcare improvements!

ANSWER: I have been involved in different aspects of patient engagement for over 20 years – taking part in the education of health care providers at all levels; with researchers; and with different aspects of health care from evidence-based practice, to guidelines, to issues around safety. There is always a learning curve – for everyone. Researchers spend years developing new treatments/cures/ways to control various diseases but if they never get to actually meet and spend time with someone with the disease it is difficult to know the actual 24/7 disease impact. They often don't realize the huge difference some of their advances have made to patients. Health care providers learn about different diseases – the signs and symptoms and how to treat people but again, unless you have the disease yourself, it's impossible to imagine what it is really like. On the other hand, patients have the lived experience but they often don't know about the challenges facing researchers in their quest for a cure or the structures of the health care system in which their providers have to function when providing their care. Seeing all involved start to understand where everyone else is coming from never gets old.
